Strategic Plan Progress Quarterly Update

The following is a summary of activities in the past quarter supporting PRTC's Strategic Recommendations.

Organizational

- Recommendation: Expand PRTC's role to become go-to advisor and partner for multimodal transportation in the greater Prince William area.
 - o Progress: Participated in Prince William County Small Area Plan Charrettes.
- Recommendation: Build strategic relationships with the business community to gain support for goals and objectives.
 - Progress: Task order issued to UrbanTrans for development of presentation template for outreach to employers. Anticipated completion mid-June.
 - Progress: Partnered with GMU on Transit Roundtable event. Presentations by VDOT (I-66 Express Lanes), Prince William DOT (planned projects), and PRTC.
- Recommendation: Seek out opportunities to leverage new funding sources independently and through partnerships.
 - Progress: Proposed four projects for inclusion in the FY19 I-66 Commuter Choice Program of Projects (NVTC). Participating in I-66 Commuter Choice Working Group to develop recommended program.
 - Coordinated with NVTC, HRTAC, jurisdictions, and General Assembly members on regional fuel tax legislation.

Transit

- Recommendation: Increase and maintain services in high-capacity transit corridors by proactively seeking capital and operating funding.
 - Progress: A dded four OmniRide trips between Dale City and Ballston as part of I-395 Express Lanes Transportation Management Plan. Projects for the Transform66 Transportation Management Plan scheduled to begin in May.
- Recommendation: Develop and apply standards and performance measures to analyze efficiencies and identify opportunities for growth through a TDP.
 - o Progress: TDP on schedule for Board consideration in July.

Transportation Demand Management

- Recommendation: Expand efforts to promote and register vanpools.
 - Progress: Staff selected to participate in DRPT vanpool promotion planning effort.
 Began VanpoolVA funded new vanpool incentive April 2nd.
- Recommendation: Identify adaptations and resources that support the latest trends and technology through updating the TDM plan.
 - o Progress: TDM plan on schedule for Board consideration in July.
- Recommendation: Proactively engage in the development and improvement of park-andride facilities.
 - o Progress: Continued to partner with VDOT on development of park-and-ride lots in the I-66 corridor.

Future Innovation

- Recommendation: Support local and regional efforts to explore new modes of highcapacity transit.
 - o Progress: Continued to participate as a stakeholder on the Potomac River Commuter Ferry Project.

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- Recommendation: Expand local transit by leveraging partnerships with Transportation Network Companies (TNCs) and other service models.
 - o Progress: Mobility on Demand Feasibility Study is on schedule to be completed by mid-June. Submitted response to Mobility on Demand On-Ramp project for Mobility as a Service application.

Transportation Voucher Program for medically-related trips

Program goal - ease transportation challenges for elderly, disabled and low-income residents within PRTC bus services area

How It Began

- mobility challenges confronting the elderly, persons with disabilities In 2011 PRTC completed a mobility management plan to identify and low income households
- One solution was the creation of a transportation voucher program for medically-related trips
- The Plan was adopted by the Commission in March 2011
- The Plan was endorsed by the Prince William Board of County Supervisors in April 2011
- The Wheels-to-Wellness program began in February 2013 and was sustained with three (3) one-year grants totaling \$798,840 from the Potomac Health Foundation (PHF)

Program eligibility:

- Reside in PHF's specified zip codes within Prince William County (i.e., eastern PWC)
- Not eligible for Medicaid non-emergency transportation
- 80+ years old; or
- Disabled as defined by the American with Disabilities Act; or
- Reside in a low income household not more than 1.9x the federal poverty level

Program elements:

- Participants pay \$3 co-pay for each one-way trip
- Program paid up to \$25 for each one-way trip
- Monthly benefit ranged from six (6) trips per month to 22 trips per month depending on medical needs.

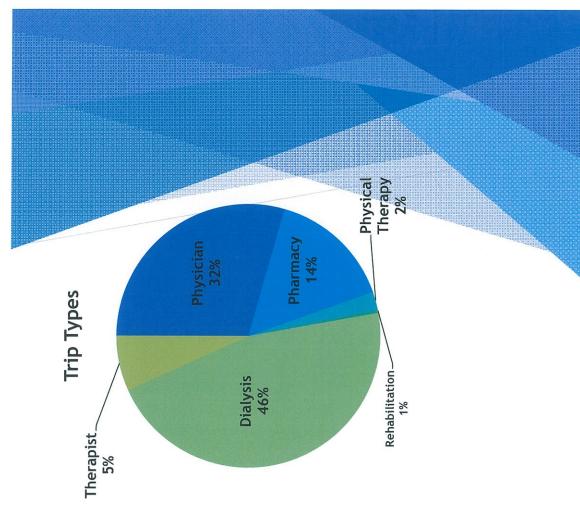

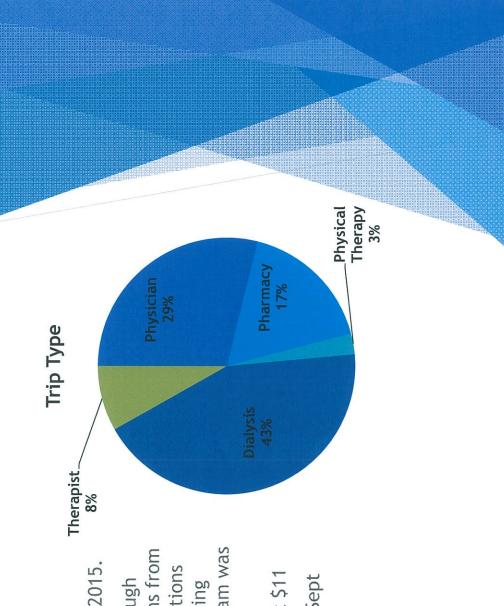

FY16

- Program only funded through August 2015.
- Mas able to keep program going through March 2016 with funding contributions from PWC (\$160,000) and private contributions (\$10,788), along with PHF grant funding carried forward (\$42,616), the program was sustained through March 31, 2016.
- □ 13,304 trips taken average trip cost \$11
- Program was suspended April 2016 Sept 2016 due to lack of funding.



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Program reinstated September 2016 with a \$75,000 grant from Kaiser Permanente, PWC contribution (\$53,174) and private contributions (\$12,296).

□ Program eligibility changes due to funding situation:

Not eligible for Medicaid non-emergency transportation

Must reside in low-income household (1.9x federal poverty level) and

80+ years old or disabled as defined by ADA

Introduced enrollment fee of \$15

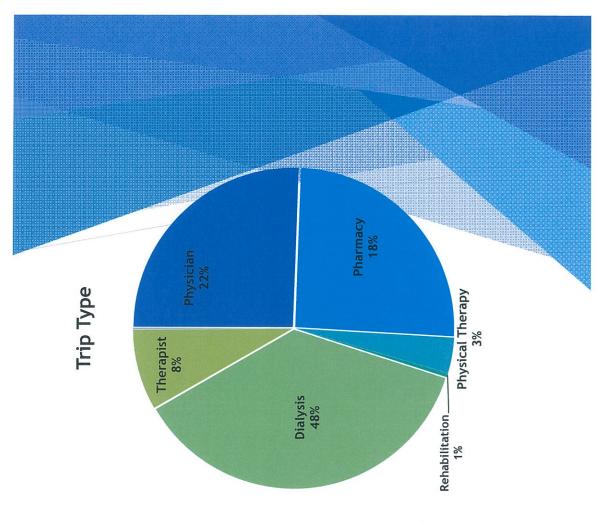

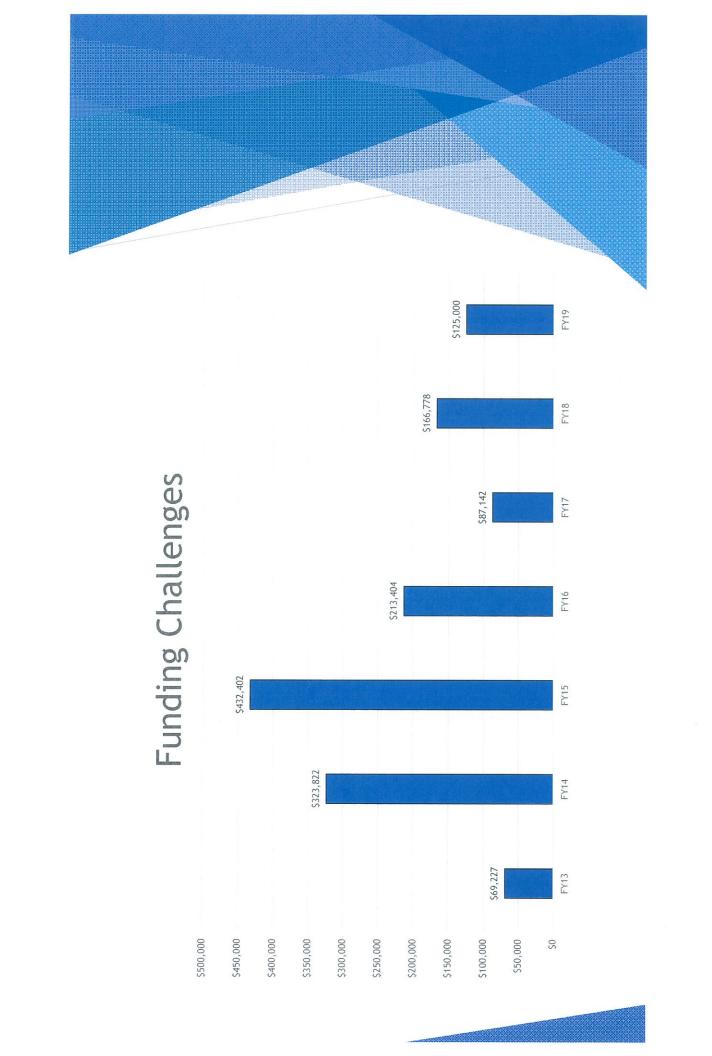

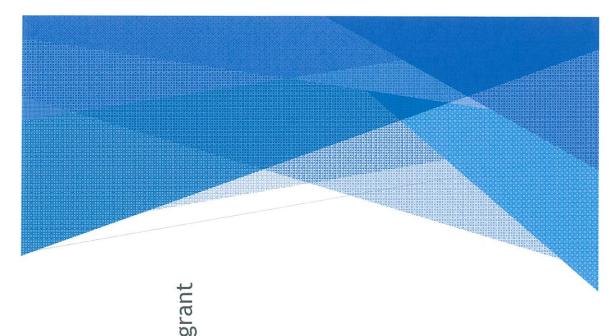

FY18

- Funding MWCOG/PHF grant \$125,000 (2-year \$250,000 grant ends June 2019), remaining PWC contribution (\$21,826), remaining Kaiser Permanente grant funding (\$16,812) and private contributions (\$3,140)
- □ Program element changes to increase enrollment:
- Reduced co-pay back to \$3 for each one-way trip
- Program payment for each one-way trip increased to \$20
- 207 enrolled participants (as of Feb 28)
- □ 6,087 trips taken (as of Feb 28) average cost \$8







□ Funding will be the remaining \$125,000 from the MWCOG grant
