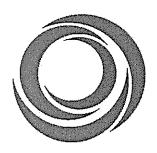

Madam Chair Anderson called the meeting to order at 7:10 p.m. The Pledge of Allegiance, Invocation, and Roll Call followed.

### Approval of the Agenda -4 [RES 18-05-01]

Commissioner Kelly moved, with a second by Commissioner Maurer to approve the agenda, as presented. There was no discussion on the motion. (KELLY/MAURER, UNANIMOUS)

### Approval of the Minutes of the March 1, 2018 PRTC Board Meeting – 5 [RES 18-05-02]

Commissioner Kelly moved, with a second by Commissioner Barker, to approve the minutes of April 5, 2018, as presented. There was no discussion on the motion. (KELLY/BARKER, UNANIMOUS)

[Commissioner Caddigan arrived at 7:20 p.m. during Agenda Item 6 and Commissioner Franklin left the table as a voting member]

### Citizens' Time - 6

Madam Chair Anderson noted that anyone wishing to address the Commission this evening will have three minutes to speak and for those who do speak to introduce themselves and to state if they are representing an organization or themselves. A number of individuals addressed the Commission (Transcript attached).

Madam Chair Anderson thanked everyone who spoke this evening and noted that the Commission takes everyone's comments very seriously, the comments are recorded, and the Commission will receive the comments in written form.

<sup>\*\*</sup>Delineates arrival/departure following the commencement of the PRTC Board Meeting. Notation of the exact arrival/departure time is included in the body of the minutes.

Madam Chair Anderson noted that there's an active investigation in progress, which is taking longer than expected and went on to note that in connection with a new allegation received on May 1st concerning alleged retaliation arising from the proposed RIF plan that was tabled at the Commission's December meeting, asked Dr. Schneider to contact the EEO Diversity Officer to the Prince William County Executive to perform a review of the new allegation and any similar claims that may arise on behalf of PRTC. Without objection from the Commission, Madam Chair Anderson noted that the investigation into the new allegations will move forward. There were no objections.

Commissioner Lawson asked if the new allegation can be shared with the Commission. Madam Chair Anderson noted that the new allegation has to do with a performance evaluation with an alleged retaliation.

### Approval of the Consent Agenda -7 [RES 18-05-03]

Commissioner Jenkins moved, with a second by Commissioner Kelly, to approve the consent agenda, as presented. There was no discussion on the motion. [JENKINS/KELLY, UNANIMOUS]

 Accepted the Potomac and Rappahannock Transportation Monthly Jurisdictional Financial Report for the Period Ended February 28, 2018, as presented. [RES 18-05-04]

### Virginia Railway Express (VRE) - 8

Mr. Allen briefed the Board on the following item(s) of interest:

- VRE staff received emergency preparedness training with the Virginia State Police (with both Troopers and Canine Units) to familiarize themselves with the railroad. Staff also received comprehensive training in the Federal Transit Administration's (FTA) certification process on the development of new infrastructure stations.
- Prior to a VRE train arriving at the Woodbridge Station on Monday evening, the train hit a trespasser
  that was in the right-of-way. The individual survived, but it is not known at this time the individual's
  condition. PRTC buses were requested and arrived at the Woodbridge Station around the time the
  train was released by Prince William County Police.
- VRE is making good progress in meeting the deadline to implement Positive Train Control (PTC) on the trains by December 31, 2018. VRE staff and Keolis personnel have been involved in training on the PTC system and how to use the onboard system components.
- As Chairman of the American Public Transportation Association (APTA) Commuter Rail Committee, Mr. Allen established a PTC Subcommittee appointing the General Manager of The Southeastern Pennsylvania Transportation Authority (SEPTA) as Chairman of the Subcommittee, who coordinated a workshop for systems nationwide and spent the last two days at APTA Headquarters in Washington, D.C. with representatives from Metro North and New York (Long Island Railroad), as well as systems from around the country to talk about PTC with regard to PTC issues and what can be done to meet the December 31st implementation deadline.
- Average daily ridership is 19,100 for the month of March and On-Time Performance (OTP) is 92
  percent (Fredericksburg Line 89 percent and Manassas Line 96 percent). Also, as a result in rising
  temperatures, heat restrictions were imposed by CSXT, whereby trains are required to slow down.

- VRE staff met with the Virginia Congressional Delegation to talk about VRE's progress and projects in their respective areas as well as VRE's future plans. Staff also met with staff from Congressman Taylor's office, who serves on the House Appropriations Committee as well as with staff from the offices of Senator Kaine and Senator Warner.
- On April 23<sup>rd</sup>, a Transportation Forum for elected officials was held at George Mason University.
   The forum was informative and transportation providers in the region talked about their processes and projects.
- At the April VRE Operations Board Meeting, the Board authorized a contract amendment for financial auditing services to upgrade a financial model developed for VRE and to provide support so that VRE can update the financial plan developed a few years ago.

Authorize the VRE CEO to Execute an Amendment for the Fourth Year of the First Option Period of the Contract for Operating Services for Commuter Rail – 8-C [RES 18-05-05]

Commissioner Kelly moved, with a second by Commissioner Skinner, to authorize the VRE Chief Executive Officer to amend the Contract for Operating Services for Commuter Rail with Keolis Rail Services Virginia, LLC by approving up to \$15,718,000 for the fourth year of the first option period, for a total Contract value not to exceed \$163,124,557 through June 30, 2019. There was no discussion on the motion. (KELLY/SKINNER, UNANIMOUS)

<u>Authorize the VRE CEO to Execute an Amendment for the Third Year of the Contract for Maintenance Services for Commuter Rail – 8-D</u> [RES 18-05-06]

Vice Chair Rishell moved, with a second by Commissioner Skinner, to authorize the VRE Chief Executive Officer to amend the Contract for Maintenance Services for Commuter Rail with Keolis Rail Services Virginia, LLC by increasing the total contract authorization by \$7,674,000, for a total amount not to exceed \$22,018,638 through June 30, 2019. There was no discussion on the motion. (RISHELL/SKINNER, UNANIMOUS)

### PRTC Executive Director's Time - 9

Dr. Schneider briefed the Board on the following item(s) of interest:

• Staff traveled to Richmond yesterday to meet with DMV personnel, who is in the process of attempting to figure out how the tax will be collected using different rates. NVTC, Hampton Roads, and OmniRide were present. At the current two-year average, 4 cents per gallon is collected and the projected regional cents per gallon tax to climb to 0.076 bringing with it the new capital rail fund, with a significant portion of that money going back to the non-bus sponsoring jurisdictions. Dr. Schneider expressed appreciation to the DMV staff.

The next step will be for the fuel distributors, along with DMV and The Department of Taxation, to carve the dollars into different pieces resulting in a flow of revenue calendar at which time it will be determined as to how the money will be distributed into the commuter rail operations fund and distributed to the different components with the challenge being what will the new dollars be in relation as to how the jurisdictions are funded as well as the implications with NVTA, and the loss of revenues will result in new questions for the jurisdictions. There's no new money, but the redistribution of a new dollar amount in a new way and it will take about the next 45 days to understand what the dollar amount will be.

Since the information is not known at this time, taxes collected in July will not be reported until September, so staff is not proposing to bring a new budget document forward until sometime in the fall. PRTC can do preliminary projections and PRTC's expectation ties into Commissioner Maurer's concern of how PRTC has historically reported revenue. PRTC will change its reporting function to have old/new collections show the delta in between, making it more functional. PRTC can survive one year on a flat budget ratio, but next year PRTC expects the traditional 3 to 3.8 percent increase, so with grant match requirements PRTC faces the declining availability to receive state funds for capital projects. PRTC will take advantage of the situation in the short-term to make improvements to service where possible.

Commissioner Barker noted that the 0.076 cents per gallon is a significant increase and went on to note that unlike the NVTC jurisdictions, PRTC doesn't have the implications of the Metro funding. It was learned during this process, that VRE is not a legal entity even unto itself, so the bills were amended to reflect VRE simply as a creation of NVTC and PRTC. There are indications that there will be additional revenues eventually, but even so there is a negative impact to the jurisdictions.

Commissioner Barker also noted that the fuel tax was realized without significant margins in both the House and the Senate, which is something to build upon. Dr. Schneider's suggestion about how PRTC will handle the reporting of the new money is a good suggestion. Also it seems there will be better communication between PRTC and the state going forward and as Dr. Schneider noted, it may take another 45 days to get everything worked out, but in the end it should become clear along with getting the monitoring reports out.

Commissioner Barker went on to note that he participated in two conference calls today. The first, with the Secretary of Transportation's office whereby it's now clear that over the next couple of months there is assurance that everything that was held in the bills will be specified as to exactly what it means, so that there's no ambiguity going forward so misinterpretations do not occur as well as to lock down on this as tightly as possible.

Concluding, Commissioner Barker noted the second conference call was a conversation with his counterparts in DC and Maryland in which we are moving forward to ensure that there's little difference between the bills in the three different jurisdictions and that there's understanding as to what the differences are. What was needed to be done has been done for this year. The bill doesn't favor the jurisdictions and transportation projects in Northern Virginia, but over time a lot of the issues can be addressed over the next couple of years.

- Article "Summary: Metro is mulling a major redesign of the bus system" has been provided for the Commission's perusal.
- Dr. Schneider recognized LaTricia Benson and Joan Martin-Morris for their years of service (10 and 15 years, respectfully).
- Dr. Schneider expressed appreciation to staff who participated in Comcast Cares Day and noted that PRTC purchased 215 metal signs attaching the signs to the fences on Georgetown South. The complexity of the area makes it hard for first responders to reach families, and in particular, families in the outer area, so the signs will make it easier for first responders to respond quicker with regard to medical issues, safety issues, etc.
- Bus Operator Mohamed Elatrebi will represent PRTC at the National Bus Roadeo in Tampa Bay, Florida, May 5-7, 2018.

- Provided this evening for the Commission's perusal is a flyer re the I-66 Fare Buy-Down Summary.
- Some PRTC buses next week will display National Teacher Appreciation Week on their headway signs to honor Teachers and there will be a push on Facebook containing a link to the "Thank A Teacher" website.

### PRTC Action Items - 11

Authorization to Purchase Thirty-One (31) 45-Foot MCI OmniRide Buses - 11-A [RES 18-05-07]

Commissioner Caddigan moved, with a second by Commissioner Maurer, to authorize the Executive Director to purchase thirty-one (31) 45-foot MCI buses via the RFTA joint procurement. There was no discussion on the motion. (CADDIGAN/MAURER, UNANIMOUS)

Authorization to Purchase Three 40-Foot Gillig OmniRide Buses - 11-B [RES 18-05-08]

Commissioner Jenkins moved, with a second by Commissioner Caddigan, to authorize the Executive Director to purchase three (3) 40-foot Gillig buses using the state funding provided by the Virginia Department of Rail and Public Transportation. There was no discussion on the motion. (JENKINS/CADDIGAN, UNANIMOUS)

<u>Authorize Publication of, Seek Public Comments On, and Provisionally Adopt the Proposed Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) Goal for Federal Fiscal Years 2019-2021 – 11-C [RES 18-05-09]</u>

Commissioner Maurer moved, with a second by Commissioner Sebesky, to authorize the Executive Director to publish PRTC's proposed Disadvantaged Business Enterprise goal for FFY 2019-2021 of 11.3 percent for FTA-assisted contracts for public inspection for a period of 30 days and for public comment for a period of 45 days and further directs the Executive Director to submit the DBE goal of 11.3 percent of FFY 2019-2021 to the United States Department of Transportation through the Federal Transit Administration by August 1, 2018, in accordance with the Regulations, in the event that no further action is required by the Commission.

Commissioner Lawson asked if there are any FTA penalties. Dr. Schneider answered no.

Commissioner Maurer noted that the Federal Government has other categories i.e. women-owned businesses, etc. and asked if PRTC is only considering the DBE category. Ms. Massie answered yes. There was no further discussion on the motion. (MAURER/SEBESKY, UNANIMOUS)

<u>Authorization to Award a Contract for Real-Time Passenger Information System – 11-D</u> [RES 18-05-10]

Commissioner Jenkins moved, with a second by Commissioner Caddigan, to authorize the Executive Director to enter into a contract with Ride Systems for a three-year base contract in the amount of \$201,560, with two (2) 1-year options to be exercised at PRTC's sole discretion. There was no discussion on the motion. (JENKINS/CADDIGAN, UNANIMOUS)

### Authorize Closed Meeting - 11-E [RES 18-05-11]

Commissioner Caddigan moved, with a second by Commissioner Sebesky, to convene into Closed meeting at 8:40 p.m. for discussion pertaining to the Executive Director's performance evaluation pursuant to Section 2.2-3711.A.1 and 2.2-3711.A.8 of the Virginia Code. There was no discussion on the motion. (CADDIGAN/SEBESKY, UNANIMOUS)

### Certify Closed Meeting - 11-F [RES 18-05-12]

Vice Chair Rishell moved, with a second by Commissioner Kelly, to certify that to the best of each members' knowledge: (i) only public business matters lawfully exempted from open meeting requirements under the Freedom of Information Act were discussed in the Closed Meeting to which this certification applies, and (ii) only such public business matters as were identified in the Motion by which the said Closed Meeting was convened were heard, discussed or considered by the Commission. No member dissents from the aforesaid certification. Closed Meeting session concluded at 9:55 p.m. There was no discussion on the motion. (RISHELL/KELLY, UNANIMOUS)

### Action Items to Report Out of Closed Meeting - 11-G

Madam Chair Anderson noted there are no items to report out of Closed Meeting.

### PRTC Chairman's Time - 12

On behalf of the Commission and Dr. Schneider, Madam Chair Anderson recognized and congratulated Ms. Altis for her 27 years of service/retirement.

Madam Chair Anderson noted the Commissioners have at their seats an Engagement Opportunities flyer.

Madam Chair Anderson noted that the Executive Board met this evening resulting in a handout containing suggestions for updating the Bylaws. Some suggestions were received and Madam Chair Anderson encouraged Commissioners to review the Bylaws, the suggestions, and to provide input. The Executive Board will meet at 6:00 p.m. on June 7th with the aim of presenting a draft of the Bylaws at the Commission's regular Board meeting starting at 7:00 p.m.

Madam Chair Anderson noted that the July 5<sup>th</sup> Commission meeting follows the Fourth of July holiday and asked Commissioners to let her know if they will be out of town that week in the case the July 5<sup>th</sup> Commission meeting has to be changed to a different date, if a quorum cannot be met. A decision as to whether to change the July 5<sup>th</sup> Board meeting date will be made at the Commission's June meeting.

### <u>Citizens' Time (Transcript)</u>

### Bea Wooden, PRTC

My name is Beatrice Wooden, Dispatcher. I just wanted to uh at the last meeting it was stated when a operator if everything is okay there's a code that comes across the radio. Um there is no such code that comes across the radio that everything is okay. We do use a 10:8 code which is used basically in transportation meaning that I'm going I'm ready to start my route uh if dispatch says something to an operator as if did you copy what I say or whatever the operator will come back and say 10:4 um and um so I wanted to just make sure everybody understood that there when we talk across the radio we do use codes we use 10:8 in service and we also use a 10:4 meaning uh did you copy what I said. Those are the kind of codes we use numbers in talking across the radio um most of the we don't just come across and say that everything is okay or whatever that we you know in service whatever you say 10:8 I'm 10:8 I'm in service. The other thing I want to touch on is um the relationship dispatch has with operators. I feel it's a good relationship and I feel that when an operator is needed to do a extra piece of work as to be bumped up to another route because a route is running late so forth VRE if we need help whatever the operators and the dispatch have a relationship that we can go to them, we can call them when they come into the window, we can ask them um Joan can you you know can you help us out can you go ahead and do this run for us or can you go to the VRE pick up people whatever the case may be the operator has the majority of the time they're going to say yes that's the relationship. If they say no or if if we don't have words or anything like that when that's a problem where they're never going to do anything for us again, the morale is down anything like that it's the next day you start all over again because the main focus is to get the customers from A to B and back safely in the in the way that we need to do that and I just wanted to say that. Thank you.

### Tonisha Belton, PRTC

Good evening my name is Tonisha Belton and I'm a Dispatcher and I also wanted to speak on some of the comments that were made at the last meeting regarding the morale being low. I was notified that I would possibly be RIF'd from my job my morale has stayed the same I perform my duties as I've always come in here to the best of my ability and to say that the contractors are being bashed like Miss Bea just said we have a very well respected working relationship with our contractor or the operators is somebody that I deal with on a consistent basis. Whatever they need we're there for them when we need something we can also go to them and have them do extra work or move them to a trip that's not theirs that's what we do and I have a unique position being a PRTC dispatcher to just oversee things that go on that maybe First Transit dispatch may miss that's why I'm here and that's why it's important for our positions to remain, because the PRTC dispatch is a unique position. Thank you.

### Markesha Smithen, PRTC

Hello my name is Markesha Smithen. I'm a Dispatcher here at PRTC. I would like to speak on a matter that was discussed in a previous meeting. I was one of the dispatchers that was on duty when the operator continued to Southhampton, Virginia. The operator passed 156 due to the inefficiencies and inaccuracies

of the software that we use to track the buses. There were late adherences for the bus, but when investigated, the operator was in the location of the route that he was assigned. Mr. Schneider stated that at the time the operator passed the exit there were two dispatchers and three other buses on the road. That statement was incorrect. The operator passed the exit at 7:09 beginning at 7 o'clock there are 26 MCIs that must start in Prince William County traveling to Metro Stations as well as the District. There are also 25 buses deadheading from the District coming back to the yard as well as 13 Links that's the total of 64 buses at that time. Mr. Schneider also stated the name of the alerts have been changed and now the alerts must be investigated before deleting, another statement that's incorrect. A late adherence continues to be a late adherence this can be deleted without any investigation. The software continues to give false information. Thank you.

### Donald Hamilton, Citizen

Madam Chairman my name is Donald Hamilton I'm a former Dispatcher here. I just wanted to point out the obvious probably of that what we've been witnessing tonight and in the past few months is people of courage willing to speak truth to power uh at personal risk. This is good news and this is real news. The people have these people have no power there are people in the area that do have power, but not the courage to stand up for these people um the only power that these Dispatchers, Bus Monitors, and the others that have been selected for RIF have is there courage, their faith, their love, and their hope and I think they should be commended and admired for their courage and their integrity. Thank you.

### Amber Maiden, Citizen

Amber Maiden, Alchemy Enterprises. I have been speaking to you all for the past four months about EEO compliance, about civil rights, about my very serious concerns as a citizen, about the rampant corruption, and I feel as though I have been largely ignored. None of you I have spoken to you for four months I have sent you all kinds of e-mails and none of you with the exception of Supervisor Anderson has even attempted to speak to me and say hey you know you're talking about some serious stuff I've heard you I've heard your concerns only qualify with regards to Supervisor Anderson she I guess attempted to reach out to me via her assistant Jake and I took it to my team and I considered it and my team I said should I talk to them and my team said no, that's disrespectful if Supervisor Anderson wants to speak to you about these issues she should call you up and speak to you about these issues. So after four months I'm frustrated but I'm not surprised I'm not surprised at all why because I know white people I know white people I know you all very well I know you probably better than you know yourselves I'll get to that momentarily. In this country when we start to talk about race black people go silent and they sit and seethe and white people look at you like a deer caught in the headlights most of them do then there are some white people who get to scheming and plotting and they start to say how can we shut this person up how can we put them down. My great-grandmother stood up to the Kentucky clan because she wanted her daughters who looked completely white to go to school with the other white kids in that community. She got her house burned down I know this country's history inside and out and I stand here before you on the graves of my ancestors and I'm not going anywhere. I have no doubt that there are plenty of people in this community who want me to sit down and shut up and disappear, I have no doubt that there are plenty of people in this community who want me dead but let's talk about something else non scholae sed vitae discimus does anyone speak Latin probably not that means we learn not for school, but for life that is the motto of my alma mater Hathaway Brown an extremely exclusive prep school extremely exclusive, Rockefellers are up in that joint. Okay so to get into that school you have to be one of two things very very rich or very very smart. I'll let you guess which one I am.

Madam Chair Anderson, Amber if you can kind of bring it to a close.

Ms. Maiden, well I have a lot, this is a filibuster I have a lot more to get to so we're going to talk about diversity what have I learned for life.

Madam Chair Anderson, Amber

Ms. Maiden, I've learned a lot about diversity.

Madam Chair Anderson, I'll give you another minute to complete.

Ms. Maiden, okay so you're shutting me down, is that what's happening?

Madam Chair Anderson, if you could bring it to closure for another minute or two.

Ms. Maiden, I really can't I really have so much to say that I think that you need to hear about diversity that is a buzz word the politicians love to use even though they have no idea what it means or how to effectively implement it within an organization. I would like to talk about it can I have another time then when I can come back to this issue because I really really think that you need to hear about it.

Madam Chair Anderson, well you're welcome to come back next month.

Ms. Maiden, can't do it in three minutes, so can I have some time next month to speak on this?

Madam Chair Anderson, our citizens' time is three minutes per person.

Ms. Maiden, but I'm not being heard any other way. I speak, I'm ignored, I send letters they're ignored, I send e-mails they're ignored.

Madam Chair Anderson, Amber I'm going to ask you to sit down.

Ms. Maiden, I read the write up with regard to the sexual harassment that has occurred. I am sick to my stomach. I look at the women at this table and I ask you what are you going to do it happened on your watch.

Madam Chair Anderson, Amber your time is complete.

Ms. Maiden, what are you going to do I'm not going to let this go.

Madam Chair Anderson, you're time is complete.

Ms. Maiden, I will be back I will get through this what I have written what I have prepared what I have to say.

Madam Chair Anderson, okay.

### Nia Tuix, Citizen

Good evening, Nia Tuix Greater DC Chapter National Action Network. Madam Chairman and the Board. I have been saying also as we know for four or five months uh that the case against the PRTC thirteen from my assessment is based on racism and lies. Lies that have uh lies that were given to the employees of

why they should be RIF'd and those lies should be addressed and looked at because because they are lies they are not substantiated for people, homeowners, parents, taxpayers to lose their jobs uh based on the budget of PRTC and uh we do want a budget we do want to reach a solution that that uh the employees these great employees keep their jobs um because the lies that have been given to them why they should leave are are uh very detrimental. Then there's thirteen uh blacks and that's that's where the racism come in comes in. It is as if from my discovery and I'm not an attorney that the blacks are carrying the weight to balance a budget where you have top heavy individuals six seven digits they're making that could shave off uh if they're willing to make the sacrifice rather than rather than the issue we have at hand now. I hope that again the Board looks at uh better options to balance your budget and to keep the public happy we ride the buses and we want to continue to ride the buses and we believe that a resolution can be made rather than throw the thirteen out of a job as if the thirteen fifteen years they have put in means absolutely nothing. We strongly recommend that you look at the top heavy individuals and the ideas and go back and hopefully reconstruct a better plan especially one that does not fire people that are very dedicated and committed to the PRTC job force and I thank you for your time Madam Anderson.

### Ken Jones, PRTC

How you doing, I'm Ken Jones I'm the Manager of the Dispatch Department um I come before you today to talk about um what I've been saying for the past couple of months that the language that was used to describe the Dispatch Department um and again it's in Mr. Schneider's proposal that he originally wrote and again it states that you know that the Dispatch Department and Dispatchers are inefficient, low performing, and lack accountability um I've asked before you know what an analysis was done to come to that conclusion and uh I know that there there hasn't been one because nothing in that statement is true, but the thing that really bothers me is that by Mr. Schneider writing those words he felt comfortable enough to include this in a proposal that went out publicly so that tells me that when he looks at me and he looks at my Dispatchers this is what he sees. These words is is what he sees when he looks at us and I can tell you from our performance I know for my performance for thirteen almost fourteen years here, I performed at a high level. I know you know Dispatchers have been here fifteen, thirteen years they performed at a high level. Do have there been mistakes made along the way in those thirteen years, yes everybody makes mistakes. Has there been critical mistakes made that has caused a disruption to service, absolutely not. If anything, the opposite is true and as far as Dr. Schneider said about us coming before you and pointing out the things that the contractor is not complying with and that being the reason for morale problems, that's not true. You'll never hear me bash an operator, because that's what I was. I started as an operator I have a huge amount of respect for the job that they do. It's not easy driving a bus with 57 passengers sometimes 70 passengers up the road and get them safely and not only that then you have to have conflict resolution skills as well, so it's not an easy job so you'll never hear me say anything negative about a bus operator. Morale problems that come with the bus operators do not emanate Dispatch. Actually, I have an excellent reputation and a great deal of respect from the operators, so I would just close by saying again that words make a difference, words matter, and you know it was pointed out earlier as some of the statements that were made at a previous meeting weren't true and the facts bear those out that Mr. Schneider made regarding the incident and and the investigation that was done by Mr. Collins. Integrity is something that's important when it comes to people respecting leaders, so II just ask you again do your due diligence, take your time to uh to evaluate the situation before you make a decision. Thank you.

### Cozy Bailey, Citizen

Good evening, my name is Cozy Bailey I'm the President of the Prince William NAACP and it is a pleasure to appear before you once again. It's been several months since I've appeared before you, but I've been following the issues surrounding the Dispatchers, I continue to read the minutes, and confer with people

who are involved in this. I can tell you as the President of the NAACP um one of our primary goals is to pursue social justice and if you look at the NAACP vision and mission, social justice for all people. My concern is first of all for these employees who are affected here, but for the entire community and I am very disappointed that this austere and august uh Commission has not come to a conclusion in closing this issue. You know my friend Ken Jones said take your time, I I urge you to not take your time, you've been doing this for four months it should be clear as I go upon you know come upon my experiences in large businesses and and having to make business decisions that perhaps the business plan is flawed, perhaps you need to go back and take a look at them and it's okay to do that because the purpose here is to improve transportation for the communities that you represent, so I would ask you to take a look at that. Never have I seen an organization where the employees continue to come before a Commission like this month after month after month, because they fill that they have no voice anywhere else. The plan may be flawed. I appreciate your listening to me, and I will continue to work with you to come to a solution. Thank you very much.

### Jerry McIntosh, PRTC

My name is Jerry McIntosh. I'm the QA, one of a few. I'm going to start by saying that I have a lot of respect for these men and women of the Dispatch. Ever since this RIF has started and the letters were sent out, these men and women has been running PRTC with very little help, very little help.

Audience member, it's not right.

Mr. McIntosh, very little help.

Mr. McIntosh, one thing I like about this is Ms. Lawson you ask questions.

Madam Chair Anderson, may I ask the audience to please, we're only listening to the person at the podium so please continue, and I'll give you a little extra time.

Mr. McIntosh, like I was saying is for the last and it's been around six months since November we've been coming up and coming up and all we ask ya'll to do is if they make a little mistake in Dispatch its I mean they are really they they got to go through it so everything that they have to do is done by themselves. When VRE calls, they gather those buses everybody else has gone home, they at home with the kids. That's truth. When we asked ya'll to look at the Wheels-to-Wellness you did its starting to go back to its normal self. All we asking you to do is take a look at the facts. We've asked ya'll over and over again to come down and meet us and see don't hear what nobody else is telling you. I go to the Pentagon I'm one of the only persons in this whole building that go everywhere that a OmniRide go and the local and when I talk to everybody we are concerned about people moving them from point A to point B safely. Ask questions, don't just go for anything.

### Emory Large, First Transit

My name is Emory Large, I'm a bus Operator, Chairman of the Union, and I hate to see all of this come to like to this situation cause this all started out the fuel tax. This is all about money. You know like I said in December it's ya'lls' job to get this thing funded and do it right, okay ya'll cut us which we're hurting then I talked to uh Frank he said he's going to cut PRTC that's why he got rid of the other guy and hired Bob and now ya'll cutting that it's all because of money, okay. So, I don't understand I mean why even if you're having problems budgeting and doing this stuff right why do it, why go through all this. It's your job to

get this money together, pay these people correctly, treat them right, then everything's flowing. I started this job seven years ago and everything was great not perfect, but great and after a couple of years it just went straight down hill, turnovers went, I mean it's just 50 percent 40 percent turnover. It's amazing. A lot of accidents, because we're getting people here with no experience, so I would just like to thank you. ### **Recommendation:**

The VRE Operations Board is asked to recommend the Commissions authorize the Chief Executive Officer to execute a one-year extension of the existing Amended and Restated Operating/Access Agreement with CSX Transportation (CSXT) through June 30, 2019.

### **Summary:**

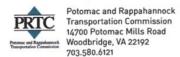
VRE's current Amended and Restated Operating/Access Agreement expires on June 30, 2018, and staff recommends extending the current agreement for one-year. During the one-year extension, VRE staff will continue to work with CSXT on a long-term agreement to include elements to meet VRE's commitment to constructing a third main line.

### **Background:**

The VRE has an Operating Access Agreement with CSXT related to VRE Operations in the Fredericksburg to Washington corridor. That agreement, entered in 1994, has been amended and extended several times. In June 2011, a new amended and restated agreement was executed with a five-year term ending June 30, 2016.







In May of 2016, the VRE Operations Board recommended, and the Commissions subsequently authorized, the VRE CEO to execute an Amendment to extend the current Agreement through June 30, 2017. In May of 2017, the VRE Operations Board recommended, and the Commissions subsequently authorized, the VRE CEO to execute an Amendment to extend the current Agreement through June 30, 2018. As part of VRE's commitment to the third main line construction, VRE, CSXT and DRPT worked to identify additional capacity enhancement projects in the corridor including constructing a third main track. Currently, VRE, CSXT and DRPT are in discussions to further identify potential capacity improvement projects, funding sources and funding mechanisms for capital improvement projects.

Throughout the one-year extension period, VRE, CSXT and DRPT will continue to work to determine capacity enhancement projects, prioritize these projects, establish methodologies to identify how the capacity enhancements will result in additional service for VRE and identify potential funding sources. VRE anticipates these elements will be integrated into the new Amended and Restated Agreement. Furthermore, CSXT has requested during the one-year extension period VRE and CSXT continue to work to identify a mutually agreed upon cost sharing methodology for the implementation and ongoing operations for Positive Train Control (PTC) and update the Master Facilities Lease Agreement. VRE will also work with CSXT to incorporate the scheduling of VRE trains into, and out of, the L'Enfant storage tracks. These changes will have no impact to the passenger train schedules.

### Fiscal Impact:

Funding is provided for in the approved FY 2019 budget for CSXT track access fees.

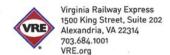

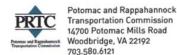
The Operations Board is also asked to authorize the commitment of VRE funds up to \$5,270,000, as the match for the BUILD Transportation Discretionary Grants program application(s).

### **Summary:**

The Crystal City Station Improvements project and the L'Enfant Station Improvements / VA to LE Fourth Track project are identified in the VRE Capital Improvement Program and System Plan 2040. Funding has already been identified to complete the initial Preliminary Engineering Design and Environmental Review phases for each project using Virginia Rail







Enhancement Fund (REF) grants, VRE Capital Reserve funds, and Northern Virginia Transportation Authority funds. The BUILD grant application(s), if selected, would provide funding to complete the engineering design for the projects.

### **Background:**

On April 25, 2018 the USDOT issued a Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) to solicit applications for the BUILD program, previously known as the Transportation Investment Generating Economic Recovery (TIGER) Discretionary Grants program. Funds for the FY 2018 BUILD program will be awarded on a competitive basis for projects that will have a significant local or regional impact. Applications are due on July 19, 2018.

The BUILD program allows up to \$15 million of the total program funding for the planning, preparation, or design of surface transportation projects, referred to as BUILD Transportation Planning grants. In order to keep pace with the associated Alexandria Fourth Track Project and the Long Bridge Project, the following VRE projects are recommended for submission for consideration under the BUILD Transportation Planning grant program, for Final Design.

- 1. Crystal City Station Improvements: relocated and expanded station with longer platform for full-length trains and service on two tracks.
- 2. L'Enfant Station / VA to LE Fourth Track Improvements: relocated and expanded station with longer platform for full-length trains from two tracks and addition of related fourth through the station from Virginia (VA) interlocking to L'Enfant (LE) interlocking.

Federal BUILD grant funds may be used for up to 80% of the project cost. The balance of the project cost must be from non-Federal sources including State funds originating from programs funded by State revenue, local funds originating from State or local revenue-sources, or private funds.

Staff, along with our consultants, will develop the required Benefit/Cost Analysis (BCA) and analyze the results prior to submission. To be more competitive, a Non-Federal overmatch (a match greater than the 20% minimum) may be required. Therefore, the authorization request for VRE funds is for up to 50% of the total cost, but may be as little as 20%. If the application is successful, a formal amendment to the FY 2019 Operating and Capital Budget for the use of VRE funds for the grant match would be presented to the Operations Board for approval and referral to the Commissions.

#### Recommendation:

#### Background:

The Virginia Railway Express (VRE) Master Agreement requires the Potomac and Rappahannock Transportation Commission (PRTC) and the Northern Virginia Transportation Commission (NVTC) to approve the annual budget of the VRE and forward it to the participating jurisdictions with a request to budget and appropriate their respective shares of the capital and operating costs of VRE.

Prince William County will fund its FY19 VRE subsidy totaling \$6,183,745 from the Northern Virginia Transportation Authority (NVTA) 30% local distribution funds instead of from motor fuel tax funds. The City of Manassas will fund \$450,000 of its FY19 VRE subsidy of \$785,898 from City funds with the remainder coming from motor fuel tax funds. The City of Manassas Park is slated to approve its FY19 VRE subsidy at its June 19, 2018 City Council meeting. The certified resolutions from the other PRTC member jurisdictions approving the drawdown from motor fuels tax funds for the FY19 VRE subsidies are attached.

#### Recommendation

Authorize the Executive Director to commence the Public Participation process for the Transit Development Plan and Transportation Demand Management Plan.

# **Background**

At the its October 2017 meeting the Commission authorized the award of the contract for consultant assistance to complete PRTC's Transit Development Plan (TDP) and Transportation Demand Management Plan (TDMP) – Phase III of the agency's Strategic Plan – to Kimley-Horn and Associates. Since that time management and staff have been working with the consultant team to develop the plans in accordance with Virginia Department of Rail and Public Transportation (VDRPT) guidelines.

The study team is in the process of developing the service recommendations that will be included in the plans. Draft recommendations will be submitted for management review by the beginning of July. Draft financial and implementation plans will follow in August and the Commission will be briefed on a draft of the complete plan at the September Board meeting. Commission members will have the opportunity to review the draft service recommendations at a stakeholder's event to be held in July. Management will provide Commission members with materials relevant to the service recommendations prior to the stakeholder event so that Commissioners unable to attend are able to review, question, and provide comment.

Management is seeking authorization to begin the Public Participation Process at this time to allow public outreach to begin once Commission members have had the opportunity to review

and comment on the draft service recommendations. Public hearings could occur as early as September, after the Commission is briefed on the complete plans. Once the Public Participation Process has been completed, management will return to the Commission to seek acceptance of the results of the public review process and adoption of the TDP and TDMP.

It should be noted that legislation passed during the most recent General Assembly session requires all transit agencies of a certain size, including PRTC, to complete a Strategic Plan every five years. Most of the requirements for a Strategic Plan were also required for the TDP, but a few are wholly new. While VDRPT does not anticipate finalizing guidance for plan development until December of this year, they have reached out to agencies currently working on TDPs to discuss meeting the new requirements for a Strategic Plan as part of their current TDP efforts. While this would result in delay to the completion of the plan, management is amenable to the idea so as to avoid another large-scale planning effort soon after completion of our Commission initiated Strategic Plan.

By authorizing the commencement of the Public Participation process at this time the Commission provides management the flexibility to begin public outreach and eventually hold public hearings based on the outcome of further discussions with VDRPT. In addition, the TDMP is not impacted by the recent legislation although it is the preference of management to present the plans as a unified whole for both public review and eventual adoption by the Commission.

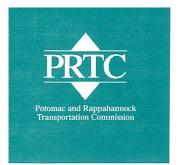

#### Background

PRTC's participation in the regional SmarTrip fare collection system has been governed by an Operations and Funding Agreement (OFA) executed in January of 2004 and revised in January of 2012. This amendment will memorialize the termination of the Maryland Transit Administration (MTA) as a participant in the SmarTrip program and add the District of Columbia Department of Transportation as a participant in the agreement.

The amendment contains additional changes to the 2012 revised agreement. These changes seek to clarify the roles of WMATA and the other regional partners regarding major operational changes to the SmarTrip system and procurements for those operational changes. The changes include a defining a major change (substantial change to functionality including new hardware or software) and establishes timelines for notification of WMATA's intent to implement a major change. The amendment adds language requiring WMATA to coordinate with the SmarTrip regional partners on any procurements for major changes.

The amendment has been subject to several months of discussion and review by WMATA and the regional partners and PRTC legal counsel has been provided the final version of the amendment for review. Staff is seeking the Board's authorization at this time so that the amendment may be executed prior to the beginning of the new fiscal year.

This AMENDMENT TO THE SMARTRIP® OPERATIONS FUNDING AGREEMENT FOR THE OPERATION OF THE REGIONAL SMARTRIP® SYSTEM ("Amendment") is made and entered into this \_\_\_\_\_ day of\_\_\_\_\_\_, 2018 by and among Alexandria Transit Company; Arlington County, Virginia; City of Fairfax, Virginia; the District of Columbia, acting by and through the District of Columbia Department of Transportation (interchangeably the "District", the "District of Columbia" or "DDOT"); Fairfax County, Virginia; Loudoun County, Virginia; Maryland Transit Administration; Montgomery County, Maryland; Potomac & Rappahannock Transportation Commission; Prince George's County, Maryland (collectively "the Participating Jurisdictions"); and the Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority ("WMATA") (collectively with the Participating Jurisdictions, the "Parties") to amend the SMARTRIP® OPERATIONS FUNDING AGREEMENT dated January 30, 2012 to provide for the funding of the Regional SmarTrip® System.

#### **RECITALS:**

WHEREAS, the Parties (with the exception of the District of Columbia) entered into the SmarTrip® Operations Funding Agreement, dated January 30, 2012, to provide for cost sharing of the funding for a seamless regional SmarTrip® card system (the "SmarTrip® Agreement"); and

**WHEREAS**, the District of Columbia seeks to be added as a Participating Jurisdiction in the Regional SmarTrip® System as those terms are defined in the SmarTrip® Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the Maryland Transit Administration seeks to terminate the participation of the Charm® card in the SmarTrip® Regional System and desires to be removed as a Participating Jurisdiction from the SmarTrip® Agreement; and

**WHEREAS,** the Parties desire to amend the SmarTrip® Agreement to memorialize their agreement with respect to the amendment of SmarTrip® Agreement.

**NOW THEREFORE**, based upon the foregoing understandings and in consideration of the covenants contained herein, the Parties hereby agree to amend the SmarTrip® Agreement as follows:

- 1. <u>Recitals.</u> The recitals set forth above are reaffirmed and incorporated herein by reference.
- 2. <u>Definitions</u>. Except as expressly provided herein, all terms and interpretations used in this Amendment shall have the same meanings as provided in the SmarTrip® Agreement, except that the following terms are amended and replaced as follows:
  - 2.1. "Amendment" means this Amendment to the SmarTrip® Agreement for the Regional SmarTrip® System between and among all Participating Jurisdictions as

defined below and WMATA.

- 2.2 "Major Changes" means new hardware or new software or updates to existing hardware or updates to existing software that creates new functionality or substantial changes to functionality that directly impacts fare policy, collection of data, collection of revenue, revenue reporting, or the operation of fare collection equipment owned by Parties or operated by WMATA on behalf of the Parties and any change that impacts the Parties' costs or revenue sharing as defined in the Operations Funding Agreement. Examples include: new Driver Control Unit, new farebox, upgrades to fare collection central system, new system procurement.
- 2.3 "Operational Support" means a change in systems, contractors, or equipment that would not significantly alter the processes or functionality to implement fare policy, collect data, collect revenue, produce reports, or operate fare collection equipment owned or used by a Party. Examples include operational support modifications required to maintain existing software and customer service for the regional SmarTrip® system; SmarTrip® card manufacturing; new smart card supplier, web logic upgrade, extension of software maintenance agreement.
- 2.4 "Participating Jurisdictions" as defined in Section 1.01(L) of the SmarTrip® Operations Funding Agreement dated January 30, 2012 is amended to mean collectively the Alexandria Transit Company; Arlington County, Virginia; City of Fairfax, Virginia; the District of Columbia; Fairfax County, Virginia; Loudoun County, Virginia; Maryland Transit Administration; Montgomery County, Maryland; Potomac & Rappahannock Transportation Commission; and Prince George's County, Maryland, except that Maryland Transit Administration shall terminate as a Participating Jurisdiction on December 31, 2018.
- 2.5. **"Smart card"** as defined in Section 1.01(T) of the SmarTrip® Operations Funding Agreement dated January 30, 2012 is amended to be defined as a plastic card, or any other media, containing a computer chip or other technology that can be used to pay a fare on WMATA and Participating Jurisdictions' transit services. Smart cards may carry different brand names, such as "SmarTrip®" or "DC One" and may consist of various technology platforms provided that the card can be processed by the fare collection equipment in use by WMATA and the Participating Jurisdictions, that card is considered a "smart card" for purposes of this Agreement.
- 3. <u>Responsibilities and Procurement Process</u>. Article 2 (Responsibilities and Procurement Process), Section 2.01 (The Participating Jurisdictions' Responsibilities) of the SmarTrip® Agreement dated January 30, 2012 is hereby amended and replaced as follows:
  - **A. WMATA Responsibilities**. In order for Participating Jurisdictions to be fully aware of Major Changes, WMATA shall provide written notice to the Participating

Jurisdictions regarding the intent to procure products or contractors for cost-effective improvements and efficiencies to the ongoing operation of the existing Regional SmarTrip® System. WMATA may provide such notice electronically. Generally, such notice will be redacted for confidential information to comply with any Non-Disclosure Agreement or limited if procurement sensitive. To the extent that confidential information or procurement sensitive information must be shared with Participating Jurisdictions in order for them to understand the effect of a Major Change on the operation of their fare equipment, the Participating Jurisdiction shall execute an appropriate non-disclosure agreement to protect confidential or procurement sensitive information from public release. Participating Jurisdictions shall identify and provide contact information for those individuals who receive notice under this paragraph. WMATA will provide notice of intent to procure for Major Changes not less than sixty (60) days prior to publishing any such intent to procure and shall thereafter coordinate with the Participating Jurisdictions in the development of the technical requirements and scopes of work, and in the acquisition of products or services which will affect the operation of the Participating Jurisdictions' fare equipment used on their local transportation systems. The Participating Jurisdictions shall submit comments within fifteen (15) days to WMATA on the notice of intent to procure, and WMATA shall give reasonable consideration to those comments. No notice of intent to procure shall be provided for any change in Operational Support.

WMATA will then, on behalf of the Participating Jurisdictions and itself, publicize, award and administer the procurement aspects of the Regional SmarTrip® System, and will exercise technical control and management oversight of any contract awarded. WMATA will retain all Financial Records, as defined in Section 1.01(G), for the Regional SmarTrip® System for three (3) years after completion and/or termination of this Agreement, as defined in Section 8.01 below, unless there is an outstanding written financial or audit question or litigation which has not been resolved. In that instance, the Financial Records will be retained by WMATA until there is a resolution of the financial or audit question(s) or the litigation. Subject to approval of the appropriate budget and the availability of funds, WMATA will fund its proportionate share of its costs of the Regional SmarTrip® System as set forth below. All Participating Jurisdictions will verify the Master Settlement Report based on the best available transaction data available to them from their reporting systems. WMATA will receive or disburse funds per the Master Settlement Report and upload and download necessary operational information, such as the Hotlisted Card List, that is required to support regional operations.

**B.** Participating Jurisdiction Responsibilities. Each Participating Jurisdiction shall pay WMATA, subject to and contingent upon the appropriation of funds, in the form of advance quarterly funding payments during the fiscal year, its proportionate share of the operating costs of the Regional SmarTrip® System, and further agrees to operate its transit system in a manner which complies with and supports the Regional SmarTrip®

System. Subject to annual budgetary appropriations, the Participating Jurisdiction shall be solely responsible for providing its share of the funds. In making these commitments, each Participating Jurisdiction acknowledges that WMATA has no independent funding apart from the funding to be provided pursuant to this Amendment and the SmarTrip® Agreement. Each Participating Jurisdiction commits to review the Master Settlement Report, to receive or disburse funds per the Master Settlement Report and to upload and download necessary operational information, as required to support regional operations.

4. <u>Notice</u>. Except for notice by WMATA on the intent to procure for Major Changes which may be provided electronically to the individuals identified by Participating Jurisdictions, all notices hereunder shall be in writing and shall be deemed to have been sufficiently given or served for all purposes when presented personally, or sent by a courier service or a national overnight delivery service, such as U.S. Overnight Express Mail, to any party hereunder as follows:

#### 5. Term.

- (A) For all parties except the District, the term of this Amendment shall begin on July 1, 2018 and expire on June 30, 2023 and shall automatically be renewed for successive additional five (5) year periods unless a majority of the Participating Jurisdictions give written notice that they do not wish to renew their participation by or before February 1 of the year of expiration of the Amendment. If the Amendment is not renewed, there shall be an unwinding period of one hundred fifty (150) days to facilitate the orderly termination of the Regional SmarTrip® System for all Participating Jurisdictions.
- (B) As to Maryland Transit Administration, the term of this Agreement shall begin on July 1, 2018 and shall terminate on December 31, 2018.
- (C) As to the District, the term of this Amendment shall begin on July 1, 2018 and shall expire on September 30, 2019. The District may extend its participation annually by exercising a maximum of thirty (30) one-year option periods. DDOT shall provide WMATA with written notice of its intent to exercise an option period on or before February 1 of the year of expiration of the initial or extension year of this Agreement. The exercise of an option is subject to the availability of funds at the time of the exercise of the option.

- (D) The first sentence after the indented text of Section 2.04(C) is amended to read: "The Termination Trigger Notification shall be provided, if possible, to all signatories to this Agreement at least one hundred fifty (150) days prior to the Termination Date."
- 6. <u>District of Columbia Provisions.</u> A new Article 8A shall be added to the SmarTrip® Agreement, as follows:

#### 8.A. District Provisions.

- (1) By executing this Amendment, the District of Columbia expressly agrees to be bound by and comply with the terms of the January 30, 2012 SmarTrip® Agreement except as otherwise changed by this Amendment.
- (2) WMATA agrees to create an operating reimbursable account to facilitate the inclusion of the District of Columbia as a full Participating Jurisdiction and for payment of DDOT's share of the Operating Costs ("DDOT SmarTrip® Operating Account") within sixty (60) days of the date of this Amendment. WMATA and DDOT agree that WMATA shall transfer from the Operating Reimbursable Account for the DC Circulator to the DDOT SmarTrip® Operating Account a reserve payment of \$156,250 which constitutes one (1) year of estimated operating costs plus a contingency of 25% to fund in advance the DDOT SmarTrip® Operating Reimbursable Account (the "Reserve Payment"). All future funding shall be in Accordance with Section 2.03 of the SmarTrip® Agreement plus any funds withdrawn from the Reserve Payment. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in the SmarTrip® Agreement, the District's obligation to make any payment pursuant to this Amendment or the SmarTrip® Agreement shall be limited to the balance of the DDOT SmarTrip® Operating Reimbursable Account including the Reserve Payment on the date the Districts obligation arises.
- (3) Anti Deficiency. Pursuant to the provisions of (i) the federal Anti-Deficiency Act, 31 U.S.C. §§ 1341, 1342, 1349-1351 1511-1519 (2004) (the "Federal ADA"), and D.C. Official Code §§ 1-206.03(e) and 47-105; (ii) the District of Columbia Anti-Deficiency Act, D.C. Official Code §§ 47-355.01 355.08 (the "D.C. ADA" and (i) and (ii) collectively, as amended from time to time, the "Anti-Deficiency Acts"); and (iii) Section 446 of the District of Columbia Home Rule Act, D.C. Official Code § 1-204.46, as amended, the District cannot obligate itself to any internal or external financial commitment in any present or future year unless the necessary funds to pay that commitment have been appropriated and are lawfully available for the purpose committed. Thus, pursuant to the Anti-Deficiency Acts, nothing in this Amendment or the SmarTrip® Agreement creates an obligation in anticipation of an appropriation for such purpose, and the District's legal liability for the payment of any amounts in subsequent fiscal years under this Amendment or the SmarTrip® Agreement does not and may not arise or obtain in advance of the lawful availability of appropriated funds for the applicable fiscal year. Notwithstanding the foregoing, no officer, employee, director, member or other natural

person or agent of the District shall have any personal liability in connection with the breach of the provisions of this Section.

- 7. Order of Precedence. All other terms and conditions of the SmarTrip® Agreement, as amended that are not expressly modified by this Amendment shall remain in full force and effect. Should there be any conflict between the terms and conditions in this Amendment and the SmarTrip® Agreement, the terms and conditions of this Amendment shall control.
- 8. <u>Amendments.</u> Further amendments to this Amendment shall be completed in accordance with Article 7 (Amendments) of the SmarTrip® Agreement.

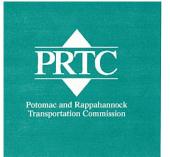

#### Background:

The \$42,117,600 PRTC FY19 proposed budget does not include a fare increase and calls for new and expanded commuter services that will be paid by the state as part of the I-95/395 and I-66 transit and transportation demand management plans. The proposed FY19 budget includes a three percent employee salary adjustment.

A public review process was held in accordance with PRTC's Public Participation Policy, including public hearings held on April 16 and April 18, 2018. Management has responded to all the comments received and has furnished copies of the comments and responses to the Commission as part of this action. A transcript of the April 16 and April 18, 2018 public hearings has also been furnished. Management has concluded that none of the public comments received warrant changes to the FY19 budget as proposed.

Thank you for your letter received April 20, 2018 to the Potomac and Rappahannock Transportation Commission (PRTC) regarding your request for direct service to Manassas Mall from Westgate. We appreciate that you rely on these services and will do everything we can to maintain as much service as possible with funding available to us.

In June 2016, OmniRide express and local service was forced to significantly reduce service due to budgetary issues that have still not been completely resolved. Service was reduced or eliminated on many routes affecting many people, including Manassas and Manassas Park. Unfortunately that meant eliminating the Manassas Park A local bus, but still operating the Manassas Park B loop. It means that someone may have a longer ride in one direction, but service from Westgate to the mall is still available. As of now, there are no plans for any changes to any of the local services in Manassas or Manassas Park. Should any significant changes be necessary in the future, such as reductions or eliminations of service, PRTC will provide ample notification time to solicit further public input.

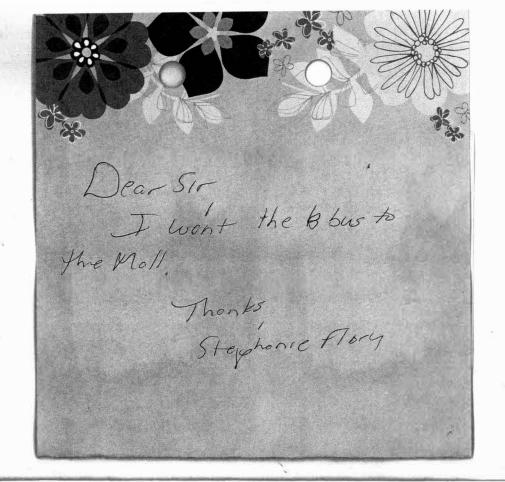

**ACTION:** 

WHEREAS, the Potomac and Rappahannock Transportation Commission ("PRTC" or the "Commission") offers medical insurance for PRTC/VRE employees through Aetna and Kaiser Permanente, supplemental dental insurance through the Delta Dental Plan of Virginia, and supplemental vision insurance through Advantica, providing employees a choice of health care options and providers to accommodate all employees regardless of whether they live in Virginia, Maryland, or DC; and

WHEREAS, management recommends awarding one-year renewal contracts to Aetna and Kaiser Permanente for medical insurance, retaining the same employer/employee percentages used to split premium costs since FY10; and

**WHEREAS**, management also recommends awarding one-year renewal contracts to Delta Dental Plan of Virginia for dental insurance and Advantica for vision insurance, offering 100 percent employer paid premiums for PRTC and VRE employees.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** that the Potomac and Rappahannock Transportation Commission does hereby authorize the Executive Director to renew one-year contracts with Aetna, Kaiser Permanente, Delta Dental Plan of Virginia, and Advantica for medical, dental, and vision insurance coverage effective July 1, 2018.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the Potomac and Rappahannock Transportation Commission also approves management's recommendation to retain the existing employer/employee premium arrangements for the medical insurance plans, and 100 percent employer paid premiums for dental and vision insurance.

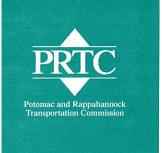

PRTC and VRE Employees

#### Recommendation:

Authorize renewal of medical, dental, and vision insurance plans for PRTC and VRE employees.

#### Background:

The Commission offers medical insurance for PRTC/VRE employees through Aetna and Kaiser Permanente, supplemental dental insurance through the Delta Dental Plan of Virginia, and supplemental vision insurance through Advantica, providing employees a choice of health care options and providers to accommodate all employees regardless of whether they live in Virginia, Maryland, or DC.

PRTC has received renewal rates from all four providers with premium changes that are deemed reasonable and are within the amounts included in the proposed FY19 budget. The premium changes are as follows:

- Aetna's renewal premiums average an increase of 1.61 to 6.64 percent, depending on plan and tier selected
- Kaiser's renewal premiums for all tiers remained the same as last year
- Delta Dental's renewal premiums remained the same for all tiers, with the second year of a two year rate guarantee
- Advantica's renewal premiums remained the same for all tiers, with the second year of a three year rate guarantee

The average Aetna premium increase of 4.2 percent is lower than the national trend of 10.5 percent, while no change to the Kaiser premiums is significantly lower than the current national trend. The FY19 proposed budget assumed a 13 - 15 percent increase for the employer share of health insurance premiums. There were no plan design changes to any of the medical, vision and dental plans offered.

PRTC management recommends retaining the methodology adopted in FY08 in which specified percentages are applied to a mid-priced medical insurance plan to establish the employer participation rate in absolute dollar terms, which then becomes the amount for lesser cost and greater cost plan options. Management recommends retaining the use of FY10 percentages for the employer share of the premium for the mid-priced plan (i.e., Aetna Health Network Only 500A Open Access HMO): 94 percent for single coverage, 80 percent for spouse and child(ren) coverage, and 74 percent for family coverage. The resulting amount in absolute dollar terms is also the employer participation amount proposed for the other plan options (Aetna Health Network Option 100/70 500A Open Access POS, Aetna IH PPO 100/70 500A, and Kaiser HMO). Employees have the choice of opting for a higher cost plan, provided they bear a higher premium cost. Employees who choose the Kaiser option continue to bear no out-of-pocket cost for medical insurance premiums.

Management recommends awarding one-year renewal contracts to Aetna and Kaiser Permanente for medical insurance, retaining the same employer/employee percentages used to split premium costs since FY10. Management also recommends awarding one-year renewal contracts to Delta Dental Plan of Virginia and Advantica, offering 100 percent employer paid premiums to all enrollees for the dental and vision plans.

#### Fiscal Impact:

The employer share for the medical, dental, and vision insurance premiums is within the dollar limits included in the proposed FY19 budget. A summary of the estimated FY19 medical, dental, and vision insurance costs is provided as an attachment.

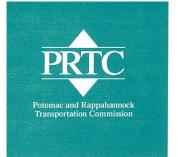

**Insurance Coverages** 

#### Recommendation:

Authorize the Executive Director to enroll PRTC as a member of the Virginia Municipal League Insurance Programs (VMLIP) as of July 1, 2018, for various liability insurance coverages.

#### Background:

On September 3, 2009, the Commission approved Resolution 09-09-06 authorizing the Executive Director to award a one-year contract to Brown's Insurance Agency, Inc. for brokerage services for property and casualty insurance, with ability to exercise nine additional one-year options. As of June 9, 2016, PRTC added cyber liability insurance coverage obtained with the assistance of Brown's Insurance Agency. PRTC has been a member of the VML Insurance Programs (VMLIP) since July 1, 2004, for workers' compensation coverage for PRTC and VRE employees.

In January 2018, PRTC staff began discussions with VMLIP regarding the possibility of enrolling as a member for various liability insurance coverages. The VMLIP provided a proposal to PRTC for coverage effective July 1, 2018, including automobile, general, public officials, cyber, environmental impairment, excess (umbrella), property, boiler and machinery/equipment breakdown, crime/bond, and underground storage tank. The VMLIP offers broader coverage at less cost than what is offered by commercial insurance.

VMLIP is one of the most financially secure self-insurance pools in the Commonwealth of Virginia and provides comprehensive property and casualty coverages, extensive risk management program support, and effective claims services to nearly 500 Virginia local

political subdivisions. VMLIP also offers many value added programs and services to prevent losses through customized safety consultations, human resources consulting services, local and regional training, webinars, videos, and online training.

VMLIP members are not required to issue procurements for liability insurance since they are a member of a not-for-profit insurance pool.

After careful consideration, management recommends that PRTC enroll as a member of the Virginia Municipal League Insurance Programs (VMLIP) as of July 1, 2018, for various liability insurance coverages, as well as continuing workers' compensation coverage through the VMLIP for PRTC and VRE employees.

#### Fiscal Impact:

There is adequate funding in the FY19 budget to cover insurance through the VMLIP, with an estimated cost of \$42,000 for PRTC.
